

### THE RIDDLE OF THE ALABASTER FONT

Anyone who has walked the beach from Watchet to Blue Anchor will be aware of the distinctive rich veins of pink and white alabaster in the cliffs. Alabaster is a translucent type of gypsum, in some forms, so soft a material that it can be carved with a thumbnail. Due to its fragility, it does not make an ideal exterior building material, although interestingly it was used by the ancient Egyptians as decorative facing on the pyramids near Cairo.

A little closer to home in Swain Street, the shops opposite the gallery and once the Central Hotel have alabaster keystones above the door and windows; a very unusual feature indeed that until recently I had considered an architectural feature unique to Watchet. That was until I was contacted by Michael Statham, the Field Officer of the Welsh Slate Forum, who alerted me to a very similar feature on a house in Newport Road, Cardiff. How this might have come about requires a separate post at another time. Alabaster has been taken from the cliffs between here at Watchet and Blue Anchor for centuries, but information is scant although there are some references. Certainly, it was transported to Bristol for use in the glassworks, and also in the production of plaster of Paris along with seaweed. Alabaster is a flexing agent and ideal in the glass-making process, the seaweed being utilised as a colouring agent. A little closer towards Blue Anchor, it would seem that the mining of alabaster was quite an industry, enough to support a small workforce and there are a number of records suggesting both seaweed and the alabaster were loaded onto waiting ships in the bay.

In Victorian times, with the arrival of the railway, the town almost overnight became a tourist destination. The Victorians were great accumulators of seaside souvenirs, filling their what-nots and cabinets with a vast array of tourist knickknacks emblazoned with the name of the destination. Some enterprising Watchet individuals saw an opportunity to make a few bob as this potential market emerged and it spawned a small cottage industry all too ready to supply alabaster carvings of lighthouses, bowls, etc. Recently I acquired a pair of turned pink alabaster candlesticks which date from about 1910 and rather splendid they are too. There are a number of more ambitious creations that have remained in the town, notably a model of St Decumans Church held in the collection of the Market House Museum and a small font that resides in the Methodist church. It is still possible to easily find fragments of alabaster on the beach so there's no reason to go hacking away at our unstable cliffs. You might like to select a piece from amongst the pebbles, find a comfortable rock to sit on, take your pen-knife and commence whittling.. quite rewarding and relaxing. I remember as a youth spending an afternoon carving a sleeping cat to impress the current girlfriend.

During my wanderings, I have discovered several fine effigies in local churches carved from Watchet alabaster and of particular interest is a doorway at Binham Grange, Old Cleeve. In Medieval times, and to some degree today, alabaster was considered to have magical powers and was ground and mixed as a potion for the creation of all manner of spells and for use in incantations including the winning over of a reticent lover. *Continued on next page.* 

# The riddle of the Alabaster Font continued from the previous page.

The most potent of this material would be from an effigy within a church and there are accounts of some of our ancient edifices having small pieces inexplicably removed. You might also find initials carved into the stone for a specific reason, but this is a whole subject in itself. Intriguing as this is, we need to visit Williton for the real purpose of this post the remarkable font at St. Peter's Church in Williton. The font is dated 1666 and has the initials R.W. and R.P. incised into it. As to the significance of these, it is open to conjecture: it had been assumed that they may be the initials of the churchwardens of the time. However, with some certainty, I think this is wrong and their true identity is much more interesting.

Some time ago, I had been in discussion with Ray State, who is involved in the research of alabaster carving. He was made aware of Watchet alabaster from the writings of the late Ronald Firman of Nottingham University, and Nicholas Stone, a London carver. (Although alabaster can be found in other parts of



Britain, the alabaster here in Watchet appears to be unique in its specific and very obvious pink hue). Firman reported that a traveller called Gerard wrote, in 1633: "Near Minehead, at this time, a Dutchman hath found out mines of excellent alabaster which they use much for tombs and chimney pieces." (for Minehead, read Watchet/Blue Anchor.) The Dutchman may be William de Keyser, the brother-in-law of Nicholas Stone, who came to London in 1613, having trained in the de Keyser household in Amsterdam and married into the family. Nicholas died in 1647 but his workshop continued, firstly with his son John until 1667, and then with a cousin until about 1672. Significantly, two of the Stone workshop carvers were Richard Pooke (RP), and the foreman, Richard White (RW). It is interesting to note that these are the very initials on the font at St Peters. Pooke was illiterate and made his simple mark, RP, on the orders. Much of the Stone records are held at the John Stone Museum in London, but John was not as meticulous as his father at keeping records: the last entry is in 1658 and unfortunately, because of this, the Williton font is not mentioned. Pooke and White were designated as 'travelling carvers', and if, as seems likely, Stone was quarrying alabaster in Watchet, it is almost certain that the font was carved in the town, by the London carvers, thence transported to Williton.

The value of our churches cannot be underestimated and, as beautiful buildings and the objects they contain, they give us a real and tangible link with the past, none more so than this font, the focal point of baptisms over hundreds of years.



### Not Another Roundabout in Williton

There are plans for yet another roundabout at the junction of Fore Street, North Street and Long Street currently a T- Junction. This is in addition to the proposed roundabout for two developments in Bank Street / Priest Street on the main Minehead road. This would mean three roundabouts in

Williton. Will this really improve traffic flow or will we end up in gridlock?

Below are some points of concern raised by the Williton & District Business Association (WDBA): -

- Delivery access, lorries reversing on the roundabout in & out of the drives of the Co-op & Somerset Farmhouse.
- Articulated lorries and buses will have to cross straight over the roundabout as too big.
- Possibility of losing some of the free parking spaces outside Co-Op
- Suggested pedestrian crossing on exit / entrance of roundabout lanes, this could be dangerous on such busy roads.
- If supermarket gets built in Banks Street, then **Three** roundabouts in close proximity.
- Already narrow pavements, by Somerset Farmhouse, which is dangerous for children walking to school, mums with pushchairs etc, now on edge of roundabout.

No in depth traffic analysis has been carried out locally since approx 2016, and with the traffic from Butlins (6000 twice a week moving) and new housing sites in Doniford road, and planning applications for two more sites locally, is a 16 meter roundabout the right answer?

Today, many people are struggling and suffering. There are wars and conflicts that continue to cause death and destruction; there's sharply increasing prices due to the cost of living increases; and there are natural disasters, like the devastating effects of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria back in February. It's not difficult to conclude that the world is a hopeless place as we struggle to come to an understanding of why all these difficult situations are happening.

At Easter, Christians remember the cross where Jesus was crucified and we think about the pain and the desolation of that tragic event. But Easter does not end on Good Friday, because then we remember the empty tomb on Easter Sunday. This offers us all the promise of a hopeful future in spite of all the seemingly hopeless situations around us. Out of tragedy, God brings us hope and the promise of new life.

At Easter, alongside the Christian events that take place, many of us will enjoy an Easter egg. You may wonder what Easter eggs have to do with the Christian message of hope that Easter brings. An honest answer would be that they have little to do with the Christian celebration of Easter directly, and yet it is possible to find some hopeful significance in our Easter eggs.

Many of our birds and animals lay eggs at this time of year, and eggs have been a springtime symbol of new life for centuries. In some parts of the world decorating eggs has been developed into an art form. Most famously, perhaps, in the Faberge eggs that are so beautiful. Another example is the Ukrainian 'Pysanki' egg. At Easter in the Ukraine it is traditional to take white eggs and draw a pattern with a pen which leaves a thin layer of beeswax. The eggs are then dipped in a coloured dye. Another pattern is drawn with the wax pen and the egg is dipped again into a different coloured dye. The process is repeated until there are several colours and several layers of wax. The wax is then melted away and what is left is an egg with a beautiful pattern in several colours. Many symbols with Christian meanings can be drawn onto these eggs.

As you are eating your Easter eggs this year, let us give thanks to God for the hope and the promise of new life that Easter offers, symbolised for us in our chocolate Easter eggs.



At last Spring is upon us and our hedgehogs should now be out of hibernation. The first priority for hedgehogs is to replenish energy levels and once that is done hormonal surges take over and so starts the business of procreation! Both males and females are able to breed from their first spring and then remain fertile throughout their lives. The breeding season lasts from late April to October, and we often see two litters before the Autumn.

I expect you have heard the old joke which asks about how hedgehogs mate. The answer is usually "carefully". Mating is a very prickly affair! Once a male picks up the smell of a female he will search her out and start a very energetic dance circling the female. He will try to position himself behind the female but this isn't as easy as it seems, as many of you have reported seeing. If the female is not ready, or is not sure that her suitor is right for her, she will turn to face him, forehead lowered aggressively and makes loud hissing sounds. I am sure many of you have heard this going on in your garden at night. The male circles the female and she will make sure she faces the male to stop any 'funny business' until she is ready. This noisy dance can go on for over an hour, either until the female decides that this male is 'the one' or the male gets fed up and goes off to find food or another female. If mating is successful the hedgehogs part company and the female is left to bring up her family on her own. The gestation period for a female hedgehog is just under 5 weeks, although she is able to slow things down if there is a sudden cold snap and she has to go into temporary hibernation. If you see a 'fat' hedgehog don't assume that it is a pregnant female. It is very difficult to tell if a female is pregnant, usually only a scan will reveal that she is. She has to be able to curl up tightly for protection and so having a large tummy would hinder her being able to do this.

If you should disturb a nest with a mum and babies in it cover it up again straight away. Do not handle the babies as it may mean that the female abandons them, or even kill them. Leave them where they are, the babies and the mother will eventually leave the nest and then you can continue to clear the area you found the nest in. I had a couple of calls last year where a nest of babies had been disturbed and the finders were happy to leave well alone until the family had moved off.

#### COMMUNITY DRIVING SCHEME FOR WATCHET AND WILLITON

WHEELS gives a very personal service to people who have no access to a car and need to attend a medical appointment or visit a friend. We collect from their front door and are around to pick them up after their appointment. A modest charge is made; for instance, a return trip from Williton to Musgrove, if you have a bus pass, is  $\pounds 12.40$ .

The number of journeys that we have done since New Year has increased to around 40 per month and sadly on 2 or 3 occasions each month we have not been able to find a driver.

We do need more drivers. Can any reader help us even if it is just for one drive per fortnight? Drivers receive expenses of 45p per mile and can choose to undertake the journeys which are convenient to them.

Coordinators provide the vital link between our passengers and drivers. They receive the requests for transport on the WHEELS mobile phone and then find a driver to take them. Usually they do this one week each month. Sadly one of our coordinators has had to give up so we badly need a new volunteer.

However, while there will be a lot of engineering work to be carried out over the next year it is deemed perfectly safe for trains to use that part of the line in the meantime.

Our winter maintenance at Williton suffered some setbacks due to the February weather and every time it rains on a Tuesday then that holds things up further. Several jobs have been completed and there will be some work continued into the summer months. The whole station is like the Forth Bridge in many ways as at no time will there be nothing left to paint! Perhaps there is a retired painter out there who would like to join the team and come along say one day a week to continue the programme?

As expected fares have been slightly increased this season as everyone realizes I am sure that overheads have gone through the roof as they have for all of us, and the costs of running a tourist attraction such as the railway poses the same problem. Those who hold them will have received a letter indicating a revised expiry date following the covid closures. However should anyone like to become members of the West Somerset Railway Association, the charity arm of the railway, then they would be entitled to a 25% discount on their ticket throughout the season. Membership rates from £27 adult, or £24 for seniors. Leaflets about this are available at the station.

As always we invite you to come down to the station to see and smell the trains once they are running, and the shop will always be open for tea/coffee/ice cream etc. Our book stall and gift cards will be available and later in the season there will be the plant and produce stall. Thank you for your past support.


