I thought I'd talk about hedgehog boxes this month. There are so many of you who have boxes in your gardens, providing first class accommodation for your spiky friends. October is the time to clean your box out. But before you do check very carefully to make sure that you don't have a resident hedgehog fast asleep. If you do find one then you will have to leave the box cleaning for a while until the hedgehog moves out.

HEDGEHOGS box cleaning for a while until the hedgehog moves out. If you are satisfied that the box is empty then put on your gardening gloves and pull out all the old bedding. Use gloves because your hedgehogs may have left some of their little 'friends' behind, and you really don't want to have a tick attach itself to you! Dispose of all the old bedding, pour boiling water in the box, to kill any parasites, and let it dry thoroughly before filling it up again with hay and straw. Position the box back in the garden, facing South if you can, and wait for it to be used again. It is a good idea to put a large flowerpot, or bucket, on it's side near the box and put straw and hay in it for the hedgehog to help itself to bedding.

Remember to keep putting out food and water all through the winter as hedgehogs come out of hibernation for a snack before going back into their boxes to continue their 'big sleep'.

We had Paddington 2 where the lovable bear transforms the prison through kindness, just as his Aunt had showed him. The Greatest Showman where being different is no barrier to belonging and The Green Planet episode where David Attenborough explains how plants talk to one another and are far more connected than we might think.

Still I sweated for an answer and then "PING," in a moment of clarity, it came. Mission Impossible! Yes, Mission Impossible that just about sums up my whole life not just my missional life. Williton Allotments

You may have seen posters around the village asking you to help save Williton Allotments. The allotments are used by those who live in Williton and the surrounding area.

Since 2006 Williton Allotments, as an association, has been managing allotment plots on the outskirts of Williton on land let by very supportive landowners who now wish

to sell that land. They have very generously offered to sell that land to the Allotment Association together with an adjoining parcel of land. Providing that sufficient funds can be raised Williton Allotments will acquire both plots of land so that the existing allotment plots can remain as such, and new allotment plots can be created along with an improved wildlife area.

To help achieve this Williton Allotments has registered as a Co-operative Society under the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014 with the Financial Conduct Authority and is now known as Williton Allotments Limited. This is a not-for-profit organisation which has the legal powers to own land for the benefit of our community.

If we can buy this land it will mean that allotments will be secure and remain available for not just people who currently live in Williton but for our children and grandchildren in perpetuity.

Established in 1926, The Community Council for Somerset (CCS) is a charity working in all corners of the County. We believe everyone in Somerset should be able to live a healthy, independent and safe life and be part of a strong and thriving community.

Our work starts on the ground where our teams act as advocates using their local expertise to ensure that each community and its people flourish. Somerset is diverse and vibrant, and we recognise that each town and village is unique. We can react to the changing needs of each community by working in collaboration to facilitate projects and enterprises that support positive change.

As a charity, our work relies on the funding we receive from our partners, who value our knowledge in making sure that the right level of investment is put into the right places, benefiting the people that need it the most.

CCS runs the Somerset Village and Community Agent service. Village Agents provide confidential, practical community-based solutions for people, wherever they are in Somerset.

Our Village Agents host Talking Cafes at over 30 different venues throughout the County. Talking Cafes provide a local place for people to seek advice and support for a range of different issues that might be causing worry or distress. If our Village Agents can't help, they will know someone who can!

Working with other partners in the voluntary sector, the team have also set up the Somerset Refugee Welcome Hubs in response to the war in Ukraine. We have been conducting the compulsory welfare checks on behalf of the Local Authority and we receive information about hosts/sponsors and guests to enable us to do this.

We also provide a number of specialist agent services that are accessed through referrals via GP's or Adult Social Care services. Our Community Agents will pick up referrals and support people to access community-based solutions to address health and social care needs. A Homelessness Agent works with multiple organisations to support those facing homelessness in the south of the county.

We also have a vital team of Hospital Village Agents who work closely with staff at Somerset's two acute hospitals, Musgrove and Yeovil, as well as all the smaller community cottage hospitals across Somerset.

They support a patient's hospital discharge by providing ward staff and families with alternative possibilities, to help reduce delays once someone is medically fit.



The Historic Gothic Barrel Organ at St Audries Church

Your chance to inspect and hear this wonderful old barrel organ, on October 17th at 7:30pm, St Audries Church, West Ouantoxhead.

The main reason barrel organs were installed in parish churches, instead of conventional pipe organs, was the lack of skilled people who could play an organ keyboard. A barrel organ solved the problem, just turn a handle! Such a barrel organ was purchased for Kilton church by the Reverend Sheddon in 1862. It would have been a wonder of technology at the time, and I imagine, created



much interest in the village, and surrounding area. Here was a machine that played hymn tunes beautifully, one person turning the handle, and someone else, possibly a village lad, hand pumping, to supply the air to the organ pipes.

It remained in Kilton church for 117 years, before being removed and put into storage.

A faculty (Church Planning Permission) was requested by the Reverend Minshull to have it moved to the church in St. Audries. It was removed from storage and installed when the faculty was granted in 1981. Over several years, skilled villagers, assisted by a professional firm of organ restorers, brought it back to life again.

Here it now stands, awaiting its call, to play the beautiful hymn tunes of Victorian times.

A booklet has been written about the St Audries barrel organ, including the other three barrel organs that still exist in Somerset churches. This booklet, and a recently made CD of the tunes, are available at St Audries church, West Quantoxhead.

At 7:30pm on Tuesday 17th October there will be a short talk on barrel organs. A few tunes will be played. Maybe, we will have a true Victorian hymn singing experience, by singing a hymn, accompanied by the barrel organ. There will be a chance to inspect the workings of the organ and maybe, even a chance to play it.

To ease any stress during the evening, a glass of wine, or soft drink, will be offered. There will be no charge but any donations, going towards the upkeep of the church, would be gratefully received. Peter Evans, Cannington.

NATURE NOTES


