

As you will be aware parts of the children's playground were fenced off over the summer as some of the equipment had become dangerous. I am pleased to say that the large climbing frame was able to be repaired and it is pleasing to see children enjoying themselves on it again. Unfortunately, the smaller climbing frame was beyond repair and has been removed. Some good news though which you may have seen in the West Somerset Free Press, the Williton War Memorial Recreation Ground Charity (WWMRG) was awarded a grant from the Co-op thanks to your very generous support for just over £4000, which is to be spent on children's play equipment. The Parish Council and the WWMRG will be working together to buy and install some new apparatus, but we would like your help to decide what kind of equipment. There will be drop-in sessions at the Parish Office on Wednesday 17th January between 4.00 -7.00pm and on Saturday 20th January between 10.30 - 12.00am where we would like to hear about the types of play equipment you (and more importantly the children) would like.

You may also have heard on the news that Somerset Council has declared a Financial Emergency both for an overspend on their budget for the rest of this financial year of £19 million and as I am writing this a budget deficit of £87 million for the tax year 2024-2025. Somerset Council has said that they are looking at all options to close that gap but there will be some very difficult decisions that need to be taken and are looking to parish councils to pick up some services from them, this in turn will have a big impact on our budget. Somerset Council has statutory obligations to fulfil certain functions, such as adult social services which they will have to fund, but it was explained at a meeting that I attended there will be "damage to some services". Quite what that means isn't clear yet, but non-essential services will be cut.

Although they are saying that parish councils will not have to take on any services that they don't want to, the inference is that if parish councils don't, the service will be lost. Particularly vulnerable to these cuts will be what is described as the "street scene". Somerset Council, through the Highways Department has a legal obligation to maintain the roads but they don't have any such obligation to maintain pavements or footpaths, litter and dog bins, road sweeping etc. *Continued on Page 8.*

As a Parish Council we already look after many community assets either directly or with WWMRG, unlike some parishes, for example, where the children's playground is at threat as Somerset Council currently maintain it. Any cuts that will be made by Somerset Council will have an impact on our community and village. Although as a Parish Council we have a good idea of what is valuable, again we need your input to help us establish what is important to you so that we can spend, what is essentially your money, wisely. We are currently setting our budget for 2024-25 and in turn the amount that we ask for from you in Council Tax. It won't be easy, some hard decisions will have to be taken, but please be assured we are doing what is possible to make sure that our village and community is somewhere to be proud of.

Having said all that, we are approaching Christmas and the season of goodwill, may I end this by saying thank you to everybody who has helped, in whatever way, to make Williton such a wonderful place to live in 2023 and wish you all on behalf of Williton Parish Council a Merry Christmas and a Happy and Prosperous New Year. Quantock Hills National Landscape



On Wednesday 22nd of November all designated Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) in England and Wales are becoming National Landscapes, including the Quantock Hills National Landscape. The new name reflects their national importance; the vital contribution they make to protect the nation from the threats of climate change, nature depletion and the wellbeing crisis, whilst also creating greater understanding and awareness for the work that they do.

This is a significant milestone for the UK and the next step in fully realising the National Landscapes' vision to be the leading exemplars of how thriving, diverse communities can work with and for nature in the UK: restoring ecosystems, providing food, storing carbon to mitigate the effects of climate change, safeguarding against drought and flooding, whilst also nurturing people's health and wellbeing.

National Landscapes teams have been at the forefront of delivering natural solutions to the main challenges facing the nation for many years. The new brand underscores their commitment to redoubling their efforts and engaging with a wider audience. In 2019, teams set themselves the most ambitious targets for nature in the sector and continue to work to meet them.

By 2030, National Landscapes aim that, within their boundaries: at least 200,000 hectares of the most valuable natural areas (Sites of Special Scientific Interest or SSSIs), which equates to 1 ¹/₄ times the size of London, will be in favourable condition: 100.000 hectares of wildlife-rich habitat outside of SSSIs will be created or restored, which is roughly nine times the size of Manchester; and 36,000 hectares of woodland, which is a little smaller than the Isle of Wight, will have been planted or allowed to regenerate. National Landscapes Partnerships will also focus on habitat restoration to ensure the protection of some of our most endangered species and increase their work to help more people to enjoy time spent in beautiful places.

Because of their size and scope, National Landscapes are ideally positioned to address the environmental issues the UK is facing. There are 46 National Landscapes in the UK, covering 14% of England, Wales and Northern Ireland including moorland, farmland, coast, forests, including UNESCO World Heritage Sites, Biosphere Reserves, a Geopark and International Dark Sky Reserves. They are the UK's nearby countryside - 66% of people in England (44 million) live within 30 minutes of a National Landscape and at least 170 million people visit them every year.

As we start this New Year of 2024, I wonder how we are feeling?

Are we excited about what lies ahead or are we feeling rather daunted? January can be a difficult time. The days are short and the nights long, with the war in Israel and Gaza and other places in the world, climate change and the extreme weather we keep having, expensive bills, etc, it can all feel a bit much and rather overwhelming.

The outlook is bleak and not much to be happy about. Back in November, I went to spend a weekend with some Franciscan Friars at Hilfield Priory in Dorset. The community, made up of both Franciscans and lay people live a simple life, mostly self-sufficient, they farm the land, have a shared electric car and think really carefully about the way they live. I enjoyed being rather than doing.

I am a very busy person, like many of us, and don't often have time to just stop, breathe deeply and simply be. On the Saturday afternoon, the rest of my group went on a long walk, but I decided to stay put, and spent some quality time on my own, thinking, walking and praying. As I started on my walk, I discovered the secret garden and loved exploring it. There was much treasure to be found if I stopped and looked long enough. I found beautiful leaves, in varying shapes and colours, fresh berries growing, beautiful yellow flowers, bamboo growing, a fish sculpture made from diet coke cans (anyone who knows me well, knows how much I love diet coke!), an old wooden bridge and just to the right of that, when I looked up in the trees there was a sculpture of Jesus on the cross. It would have been so easy to miss all of this if I had carried on the path and not taken a detour into the secret garden.

I wonder what treasure we might find as we journey into this New Year? It doesn't have to be treasure of silver or gold, for there is treasure all around us, in the beauty of creation, in the people we meet, in the embrace of a loved one, in the rhythm of slowing down and simply being. As we start this New Year when life can sometimes seem rather gloomy, let's commit to seeking out the treasure in the everyday and enjoying all that God has given us.

DECEMBER

We all experienced a lot of heavy rain. The most on one day fell on the 2nd, I measured 34 mm (over an inch). And we had the first frosts.


For the first time in years the trains to London were stopped for a while as the re-rout points were also flooded.




