## **Threatened Closure of Williton's Recycling Centre**

As 2023 drew to a close, the Parish Council was aware that Somerset Council had declared a financial emergency and was doing everything it could to avoid a

S.114 notice (effectively bankruptcy) if it could not set a budget. As part of that process, Parish and Town Councils were asked to consider taking on assets and services for which Somerset Council is currently responsible. In mid-January we heard that



part of Somerset Council's planned savings included the potential closure of Williton's Household Waste Recycling Centre.

A very quickly-arranged public meeting was held in the Pavilion, attended by about 200 people representing 17 communities from across West Somerset. It was also attended by officers from Somerset Council along with Cllr. Darch who is the lead on Climate Change and the environment. Members of the public expressed their concerns and anger about the proposed closure and the amount of damage it will cause to the environment and our communities.

Apart from the officers and Councillor Darch there was not a single comment in favour of the closure. It appears that the suggestion to potentially close the five sites across Somerset was based on a simple calculation based on costs only rather than looking at the knock-on effects of closing sites which will have far greater ramifications than just a financial saving that in the scheme of things is a small amount of money.

Subsequent to that the meeting, the Chairs of our surrounding parishes have met and agreed to send a very strongly worded joint letter to Somerset Council expressing our concerns and asking for properly-undertaken research to be carried out to establish the full impact of the closure of any recycling centre. Williton Parish Council has also sent its own letter condemning the proposal.

## **Recycling Centre (Cont'd from page 3)**

At the time of writing we are being told that, rather than just the closure of the recycling centres across Somerset to save money, Somerset Council is now looking at "savings in the core contract" - the meaning of which is unclear. They also stress that nothing has been decided and that the subject of closures will go out to public consultation after the 20<sup>th</sup> February. Whatever happens, the Parish Council will be doing its utmost to ensure that the centre stays open.

## **Speed Control, Priest Street**

After many years of planning I am pleased to say at last that the long-awaited speed indicator device has now been set up in Priest Street. Currently it is recording the speed of vehicles but not showing the speed to motorists. This is so that we can see what effect the machine has on the speed of traffic when it is turned on. I am also pleased to see that we have some more volunteers for the Speed Watch scheme. Hopefully, over the next few months, we will see fewer incidents of speeding and a much safer village. Thank you to everyone who has come forward to help us with this project.

## **New Playground Equipment**

It was disappointing that our drop-in sessions to find out what sort of new playground equipment was wanted for the children did not produce any ideas.

We have been given a grant to spend on new equipment and it would be nice to see what the children want, rather than what we give them. If you have any ideas, please talk to anyone in the office.

Hello folks. I thought I would share the following article with you. It was written by Kay Bullen, a trustee of the British Hedgehog Preservation Society.

"Spring is here and hedgehogs who have hibernated will be starting to wake from hibernation. They will be sleepy and very thirsty and will head for the nearest water. Although good swimmers, many die in ponds because there is no way out for them. By putting a sloping edge, a

ramp or even some green plastic-coated wire netting down into (not across) the pond we can provide an escape route for them to use should they fall in. Also, if the pond is kept topped up hedgehogs might be less likely to topple in. New ponds could have a sloping side planned to make it easy for hedgehogs and other animals and birds to reach the

water safely.

It is not only hedgehogs that are out and about but gardeners as well. Whilst the hedgehog is the gardeners' friend, gardeners are not always hedgehog friendly. Many of the jobs we do in our



gardens can affect and even harm hedgehogs. So please take care when tidying up garden debris, pulling down sheds (a favourite nesting site) and strimming long grass and brambles (hedgehogs won't run away when they hear strimmers, they will do what is natural for them and curl up into a ball).


Hedgehogs are not territorial: although they tend to have home patches. A females' home patch will be just big enough to support her and her hoglets. A male's patch will be much larger in the breeding season as they wander long distances searching for females. Once the autumn comes the males' home patches will become smaller as they concentrate on preparing for hibernation. So, if you see a hedgehog on a regular basis in the breeding season it is more likely to be a female. If you are able to leave water and some meaty cat or dog food out each night this will encourage any females to stay around and eat your garden pests too! However, males will have other priorities and will move greater distances as they are more nomadic in the breeding season.

The British Hedgehog Preservation Society can give general advice and perhaps details of a local hedgehog rehabilitator who you can contact for more advice. Their number is 01584 890801."

# **St Peter's School News**

The boys and girls in Reception have just finished exploring some of the different traditions seen across the world to celebrate Lunar New Year. We have drawn Chinese characters

onto red envelopes requiring great precision and coordination, we have hung beautiful lanterns created using careful scissor control and paper; and designed and made the body and tail of a dragon using natural materials to print onto fabric. We ended the week by performing our very own dragon dance and parade music – a tradition believed to drive away evil spirits and bring good luck and blessing to the community.

This month in Year 1, the children have been learning all about what experiments are and how they can be scientists by carrying out their own experiments! So far, we have explored which materials are waterproof and we've also looked at ice and discovered that the warmer the conditions are, the faster ice will melt! Next week we are going to explore which materials are most air resistant as we make parachutes for our teddies!

Wow, what a busy few weeks we've had in Year 2. As scientists, we've been learning about materials and their properties. Miss Oliver told us she had a problem with her curtains because they were letting light through so we carried out an investigation to find out which material would be best for a pair of curtains. We used a torch and tested out lots of materials. We found out that an opaque material does not let any light through such as wood or metal, but we agreed that this material wouldn't be very suitable to use as a curtain.

In Year 3 the children have been learning all about trade and where our food comes from and how food reaches the shops. In science, we have been looking at different types of animals and the characteristics of their habitats. As a class we went on a habitat walk around our school to see what animals live around us.

In Year 4, we have been learning more about Dementia, with regular visits to Croft House and engagement in our Archie Project workbooks. Nature reserves have been made in science; regular observations are being recorded in the hope that we will see the formation of some habitats. Chocolate has been the main topic of Geography this term, as we learn about 'Trade' and how products are imported and exported. We were surprised to find out that a chocolate bar takes around 150 days to reach the shop shelf!

The next half term brings many opportunities to explore the community with visits planned to St Peter's Church and East Quay. We also eagerly anticipate World Book Day, British Science Week, and the Year 4 residential to Kilve Court.

the recent Somerset competition held at Strode College. All the athletes took part in a range of target activities with many demonstrating some outstanding levels of accuracy.



## Williton Allotments

Things have moved very fast for us with our project to secure, develop and protect Williton Allotments since the last article I wrote for Williton Window, and we have raised the money to make sure that there are allotments in Williton for many

generations to come.

Those of you who called to see us at our table in the Pavilion for "What's on in Williton" on 24th February will already know a little of what, with your help, we have achieved. For those who missed that, here is a summary of what has happened so far and what will be happening soon.

Just before Christmas we received a letter from the Dept of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities telling us that our application for a grant from the Community Ownership Fund was successful and in January we heard that our application for a grant from Somerset Council was also successful.

This means that with the grant from Williton Parish Council I told you about in November and the very generous donations we have received, we are now at a point where we can instruct solicitors to do the legal work to buy the allotments and the adjoining paddock.

It will take several weeks until the legalities are completed and once that is done we will start doing the work needed to develop the new allotment plots.

We have conditions that come with the funding and we must complete everything by this time next year. The past year has involved a lot of paperwork for us but we are soon going to be getting on with the exciting stuff.

We are aiming to have the first allotment plots available by the summer so, if you would like one, please contact Elizabeth Payne on 01984 633084.

We still must raise a bit more money to make sure that we can install everything we want to but we can say that we are within touching distance of owning the allotment site so that they stay as allotments for our community and surrounding areas.

Thank you once again for the tremendous support you have given us.

## ... Link Path Now Open!


